

## REGIONAL COUNCIL REPORT

The very first meeting I have attended of the North West Regional Council was held at St Andrew's Scottish Episcopal Church in Milngavie. Representing St Bride's were myself and Carol Lovett, who is our Lay Representative. The minutes of the last meeting were proposed by the Revd Andrea Hagenbuch and seconded by David Simmons. Fr Dominic Ind will continue as chair of the NWRC, proposed by Louise Benson and seconded by Mrs Lovett. David Simmons will continue as vice-chair, and Tim Rhead as Secretary, and Richard Smith is to replace the outgoing Fr Sydney Maitland as Boundary Commission Representative, all proposed and seconded by the same. Apologies for absence were issued on behalf of Fr Heller Gonzalez and Morag O'Neill of St Augustine's Dumbarton, Fr David Guest of All Saints' Bearsden, Fr Peter Bradley of St Bride's and David Sheen of St Michael's Helensburgh.

The next Diocesan Council will be held on 7 March at Holy Trinity Scottish Episcopal Church in Kilmarnock. Ms O'Neill remains on the Synod, but nobody else from the region is standing. There was no report from the last Diocesan Council meeting, however it was mentioned that St Bride's has been granted more financial support.

St Andrew's Milngavie reported well-attended Christmas services with children attending most Sunday Masses. Quinquennial work is proceeding, and new emergency lighting is soon to be commissioned. Two new members of the vestry have also been appointed. The church also holds Church Walks periodically. Lastly, The Revd Andrea Hagenbuch is leaving St Andrew's on 1 March, to be followed by the vestry meeting the Dean the following day. We all wished, and continue to wish, Andrea the best of luck for the future.

As for St Bride's, our Christmas services were advertised in the Community Magazine, which attracted some new congregants. Our Community Carol and Nine Lessons & Carols Services were well-attended. After a generous donation, a new Nativity set was purchased. There is now a heavy demand for the usage of our hall, which is being coordinated by Miss Annie Blackwood. Repairs are needed to the rendering on the South Wall, as well as the windows of the Rectory – it is hoped that the needed repairs will commence in the near future.

St Michael's Helensburgh reported nearly 200 attendants for their Advent Carol and Nine Lessons & Carols services. There are two new walking groups, including the "Golden Amblers" who meet for a local walk bi-weekly. On Tuesdays, there is a Holy Hour, and Thursdays see a Night Prayer and

Meditation service. The first stage in restoration for the church organ has been completed, with the second stage planned for later in the year. Three worship team leaders have now been appointed for St Michael's: Gareth Hooper, Richard Smith and Stephen Brandon. St Michael's also boasts a strong relationship with the local Roman Catholic and Church of Scotland churches, with said relationship only growing. Fr Dominic has also been appointed as Deputy Lord Lieutenant for Dunbartonshire.

St Augustine's Dumbarton unfortunately had no report, as Fr Heller is away in Spain visiting his ill father, and Ms O'Neill recently suffered bereavement and is currently recovering from eye surgery. We wish them both the best.

Mr Rhead has been in contact with All Saints' Jordanhill, which has recently appointed The Revd Mary Bowden – who preached at St Bride's some time ago – as their interim priest. Fr Dominic has reported that there has been a very large increase in the Diocesan Quota for St Michael's – it was suggested that legacy payments may have contributed to that. Fr Dominic also congratulated The Revd Andrea for her commitment to the NWRC over the past ten years, and her exemplary attendance record.

Members of our churches have been invited to the Ascension Day service held at All Sants' Bearsden on Thursday 14 May. The next NWRC meeting has been agreed to be held on Wednesday 24 June at St Bride's, likely at the Rectory.

Personally I found this meeting useful to attend as a learning moment, and have committed to attend every meeting where travel allows. I also very much enjoyed meeting the other members of the Council, and look forward to working with them in the future.

## Glasgow City Mission - Child and Family

The Women's Group were delighted to welcome Margaret from the Glasgow City Mission Child and Family Centre, who provided us with an overview of the Christ focused work of the centre.

The following information from the GCM website provides an excellent summary of Margaret's contribution:

The Child and Family Centre have been working with children in Govan since 1986 and is knitted into local people's lives. The Centre provides Parent and Toddler Groups, All Age Groups, family support classes and advice for parents, plus after school clubs and holiday clubs. The aim is to break the cycle of poverty and give the children the best possible start in life. To achieve this, the Centre provides a safe, educational and nourishing environment where the children can have fun and are encouraged in their development.

Parents are also equipped with skills and confidence – parenting is not always easy! Relationships within the family and Centre are key. These are built during weekly coffee mornings, parenting groups, healthy eating and exercise groups and daily conversations.
